I was trying to explain yesterday how the scheduling might work for this. Basically, our digital team have collated the number of impressions that can be achieved in the area over that time period. Your ads would only go out to the listeners in that area who are actively listening. So, the ads aren't scheduled over specific spots but instead will only be played to specific individual listeners at the time of their listening. So, if I choose to tune into Kiss at 4pm on December 13th and I was based within the Winchester postcodes we've included, I would then receive that advert in the next ad slots break. Regardless of time. So, to Adrian's concern, if there are younger people listening, they would hear it when they listen, not at 7am when they're unlikely to be awake...!

In this proposal, we've not broken the demographics down by age, but this is a possibility. It will just reduce the number of people you'll reach though. So, we could find say 50,000 impressions (as an example – I don't know if this is accurate) of 18–25-year-olds across all brands if you want to ensure speaking only to the younger audience. As you'll see from this proposal deck, this service is called 'Refine' and comes at a slightly higher CPM rate to 'Reach' – which is the BRAND + DATA solution I've proposed. I think what I've suggested is the best route for you but happy to look at using the 'Refine' service if you'd like.

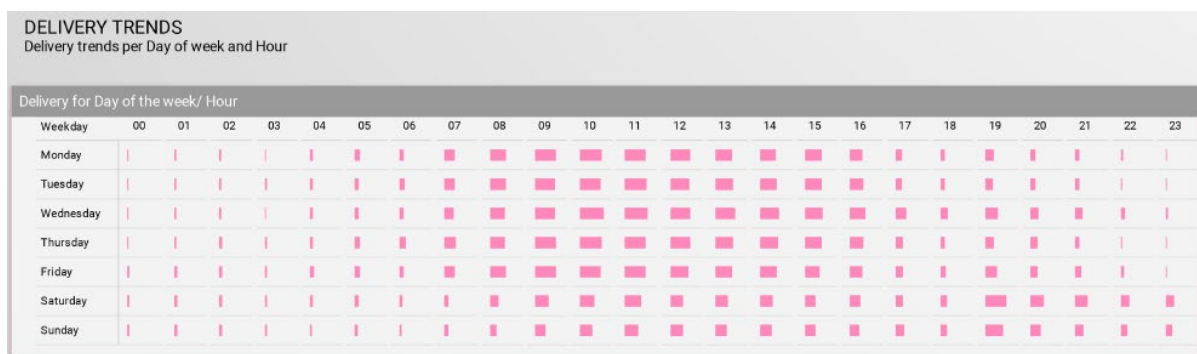

Carbon Neutrality and Designing for Low Carbon Infrastructure

- Mitigating and adapting to climate change and designing for low carbon infrastructure are vitally important and defining issues for the Plan.
- The Local Plan has a key role in assisting the council with meeting its net zero target by 2030.
- The Planning & Energy Act 2008 gives Local Planning Authorities the power to set local energy efficiency standards in their Local Plans subject to assessing the cost of these measures through the Local Plan Viability Assessment.
- Policy CN3 in the Plan requires residential development to have a total energy use of <35 kWh/m²/year and to be net-zero carbon and for non-residential development to meet BREEAM Excellent standard.
- There are a number of other policies in this topic that address climate change and adaptation that are included in this topic which are considered by Officers to be much stronger than the policies in the current adopted Local Plan.
- The key message is that climate change and adaptation measures need to be addressed as part of the **design process**.





High Quality, Well-Designed Places and Living Well

Achieving high quality, well-designed places is a critical part of place making and an integral component of tackling climate change, and the council's journey towards net zero, as well as supporting improved health and well-being of our population.


In order to raise the bar on design a new topic has been included in the Plan on 'High Quality, Well Designed Places and Living Well' which has built on the feedback from the Design South East Local Plan workshops that took place in autumn 2021.

Discussions have also taken place with the Town Forum about how the Local Plan can be used in a positive way to raise the standard of design.


This topic is based around fundamental concept that good design comes out of **design process** and this is a defining point that flows through the content of the whole of the Regulation 18 Local Plan.

Biodiversity and the Natural Environment

- The Local Plan prioritises development towards sustainable transport modes of travel which includes safe and accessible means of transport with an overall low impact on the environment which includes walking, cycling, ultra-low and zero carbon emission vehicles, car sharing including car clubs and public transport.
- The Local Plan can be used to promote the concept/principles of 15 minute neighbourhoods and focus new development in the most sustainable locations with high quality infrastructure to promote active travel and access to public transport buses and trains to connect together neighbourhoods, facilities and services.
- Policies in this topic focus around using the **design process** to really focus and prioritise sustainable transport modes of transport over the private car because of the rural nature of the district, it may not be possible to completely rule out the use of the private car.
- Another key change in the Plan is the move away from setting defined car parking standards and instead Policy T2 requires developers to as part of the **design process**, to demonstrate why they are planning for the number of car parking spaces in their developments and to be able to demonstrate how their proposal is linked to bus stops, Public Rights of Way and cycle route not just within the site boundary.

The Historic Environment

- The current Local Plan has been largely successful in preventing development that adversely affects the countryside and protected sites with high conservation value, by restricting the type of development that can take place there, there are some new challenges for the Plan:
- Ensuring a brownfield first approach with greenfield second.
- There are changes in legislation (some still awaited) which require more of our district to be safeguarded and used to meet the needs of biodiversity net gain, the multi-use of green infrastructure, open spaces and to help development achieve nutrient neutrality.
- The Local Plan has a key role to play in resolving the many competing demands made on the natural environment and biodiversity and ensure any unavoidable impact caused by development is mitigated on site, or offset as a last resort, or where local conditions indicate that this would be the most beneficial approach.
- The policies in this topic support and reinforce each other with Green and Blue Infrastructure and Biodiversity Action Plan requirements for new developments reducing the impact on the environment and providing biodiversity net gain.
- They will also ensure that there is open space (Policy NE3), Biodiversity Net Gain (Policy NE5), Nutrient Neutrality (Policy NE16) are provided in new developments requiring planning permission.

Homes for All

- The historic environment is an irreplaceable resource that needs to be protected and enhanced for the benefit of current and future generations.
- The historic environment of Winchester District has a wealth of iconic heritage assets that are a major cultural and environmental strength of the district and are important in terms of defining the character and significance, local distinctness, and cultural identity of the individual settlements.
- This particular topic includes a number of policies on Historic Environment (both designated and non designated assets), Conservation Areas and Registered Parks and Gardens that have been developed in close consultation with Officers from Heritage team and Historic England.
- One of the key changes from the current adopted Local Plan and this Regulation 18 Local Plan is the inclusion of Policy HE 14 which deals with energy efficiency improvements to listed buildings and non-designated buildings in order to align this topic with the council's climate emergency.

- One of the key requirements of the Plan is to identify land to accommodate housing growth the quantum of which is set out in the government's standardised housing methodology (715 dwellings per annum).
- This calculation is carried out each year, so the number may change in 2023 (it is unlikely to decrease but may grow), and will not be fixed for our Local Plan until the Regulation 19 version is submitted for a Local Plan Examination.
- Taking account of the response to SIP consultation, the Sustainability Appraisal of the options, the evidence base and updated information on housing requirements and supply, the Plan has identified a development strategy which is primarily based on Approach 1 in the Strategic Issues & Priorities document, which mirrors the development strategy in the existing Local Plan, but has been updated and modified to include elements of Approaches 2 (focus development on Winchester itself and other larger and more sustainable locations) and Approach 4 (dispersing development around the district largely in proportion to the size of the existing settlement).
- The Plan carries forward a number of housing sites that are either partly under construction, have the benefit of planning permission, or are existing Local Plan allocations, but where either work has not yet started on site or development is still underway (e.g. Barton Farm Major Development Area). It also includes a windfall allowance for sites which may be developed but are not allocated.

- In the section called 'Local Plan Allocations that are needed to deliver the development strategy' there are a number of new site allocations in Winchester Town, the South Hampshire Urban Area and the Market Towns and rural area (Policy H5).
- The Plan also includes a section on the needs for Gypsy and Travellers based on the finding of the updated Gypsy and Traveller Accommodation Needs Assessment and Pitch Deliverability Assessment. These are calculated separately.
- Sites that have been either carried forward or are new sites are clearly labelled with tabs on the right hand side of the Local Plan.



Traffic safety fears at new housing development

By Toby Oliver

A 'DANGEROUS' access road has become a major cause for concern for residents in Alresford.

Whitehill Lane will be needed for construction traffic for a new roundabout on the A11 Alresford bypass.

This is in preparation for the construction of a major housing development off Sun Lane, along with open space and an area for employment.

The 200-house development by Taylor Wimpey is the biggest single expansion of the market town in more than 90 years.

However, Chris White, of Appledown Lane, has serious worries over the safety of using Whitehill Lane for the construction of the roundabout.

Mr White said: "I am extremely concerned about plans to block off the Sun Lane end of Whitehill Lane. This would mean that all construction vehicles would have to use Whitehill Lane via Bishop's Sutton. It would not be possible for two articulated lorries to pass one another on this lane - for such a vehicle to attempt a long reversal would be equally impossible, if not downright dangerous."

"Southern Water access the treatment works with articulated tanker vehicles, often more than once a day. If they are denied access, the whole of Alresford's

sewage treatment would pile up."

Mr White suggested that it may be better to widen Whitehill Lane or create a new bypass.

Local councillor Margot Power said: "I share residents' concerns about the use of Whitehill Lane. The impact on residents and businesses will be rather more dangerous than inconvenient."

"Hampshire County Council has insisted that Whitehill Lane is the best route."

"I have asked the developer to provide details of how they intend to manage the traffic along a single width road. That information has not been forthcoming."

A spokesman from developer Taylor Wimpey said: "We understand local residents' concerns regarding access to our proposed development of Alresford Down."

"We would like to assure residents that our plans are being carefully considered and that we will continue to work closely

with both Hampshire County Council and Winchester City Council to ensure the most appropriate access route for construction vehicles is agreed."

Councillor Nick Adams-King, the County Council's executive member for highway operations, said: "The details of the construction route for these works are currently still being assessed as part of the planning permission process for the Sun Lane development, and have not yet been agreed."

Market up and running

On the first morning of the event in the Inner Close lots of people were looking around at the large number of products on offer.

The wide range of stalls include food, drink, jewellery crafts and art work. The ice rink is not part of the market again this year with the performance stage returning.

High Andros was at the market with Devonian Driedairy Biscuits this year. Hugh helped the Grand Tour presenter James May create a sign of his own called Aston Parsnip.

Hugh said: "It's fantastic to be back here for Christmas."

Matt Hall, from The Cheese Wedge Company, said: "We have been trying for four years to get a stall at the market and we have finally got here. Come on down and try our cheese. We have a sprouts and bacon cheese which is a Christmas edition and very unusual."

Rebecca Woodhead, from the charity Mountbatten Hampshire, said: "We used to be Coombe Mountbatten Hampshire. We're here today to raise some awareness, let people know we're here, raise a bit of money and have fun with it. We've done around three years at the market. It has been really low."

Sally Jenkins, from Flapjacksery said: "This is the first time we have been at the market since before Covid. We're off to a grand start this morning and the sun is shining which makes it all the better."

Endangered crayfish released into the wild at secret location

Conservationists have released almost 200 white-clawed crayfish – one of the UK's most endangered native species – into the wild to help boost dwindling numbers of the rare crustaceans.

Experts from Hampshire & Isle of Wight Wildlife Trust and Bristol Zoological Society released the crayfish at a secret location on the River Itchen's upper reaches in a coordinated effort to safeguard the species' future.

The crustaceans, which are the UK's only native freshwater crayfish species, had been reared from eggs by the Bristol Zoological Society, to ensure they had a good chance of survival when released into the wild.

Altogether, 192 crayfish were released in time for the breeding season.

Despite once being common and widespread in British rivers and streams, white-clawed crayfish numbers have declined dramatically by at least 70% across the UK since the 1970s. This decline has been even more severe in Hampshire.

They are currently threatened with extinction due to pollution, habitat loss and, most prominently, the spread of invasive crayfish species, such as North American signal crayfish, which carry crayfish plague, a disease that is deadly to our native species.

The release forms part of Hampshire & Isle of Wight Wildlife Trust's Southern Chalkstreams Project, which aims to protect chalk stream habitats and the species that call them home, especially white-clawed crayfish.

Dr Ben Rushbrook, the Trust's principal ecologist who leads the crayfish conservation project, said: "This, and earlier releases have allowed us to extend the range of white-clawed crayfish on this stretch of the River Itchen. This will increase the species' long-term security by providing it a degree of resilience to the impacts of potential threats, such as pollution."

The Trust's Southern Chalkstream Project has

contributed to the release of over 1,400 captive-born white-clawed crayfish in the past eight years.

The River Itchen has one of the last remaining white-clawed crayfish populations in Hampshire. Earlier this year, Wildlife Trust staff and volunteers discovered a cluster of white-clawed crayfish in a river channel at Winnall Moors Nature Reserve in Winchester. Until then, the species were thought to have died out from the site over 30 years ago. The presence of white-clawed crayfish indicates a healthy ecosystem as they require clean, well oxygenated and nutrient-rich waters.

Former Marriotts shop to become seven new homes

A FORMER furniture store – which used to be one of Portsmouth's longest-standing businesses – has been earmarked for conversion into seven houses.

Developer Amherst Properties has applied to Portsmouth City Council for permission for the change of use of the Marriotts units in New Road, Buckland to a terrace of three-bedroom homes.

The properties have no commercial potential and residential is the obvious alternative use, a statement submitted with the application says. Clearly the properties were once seven dwellings before being converted to commercial use.

The applicant has considered converting the properties into residential by way of the prior approval process. This could produce more resi-

dential units but the external appearance would not be improved.

It adds that this process, which relies on permitted de-

velopment rules, remains a 'fallback option' in case planning permission is refused.

In 1969 the council granted planning permission for a block of 24 flats of sheltered accommodation to be built at the site although it most recently housed the furniture store until it closed last year.

No parking would be provided for the new homes, relying instead on on-street parking along New Road. Amherst said residential use of the building would create less traffic than a shop.

However, warehouse buildings behind the store are earmarked to be demolished to make way for gardens for each house and will include cycle storage.

There is a shortage of family housing in the city and this proposed development would

deliver seven good quality homes in an accessible location, the developer's statement adds. Overall, the proposals are considered consistent with the city council's aspirations to bring about a more residential development in sustainable locations.

Marriotts had operated from the site for 94 years before the decision to shut was taken in late 2020 after owner Patrick Marriott died at the age of 91. The shop was set up by his parents Ted and Margaret, and he worked well past his retirement age, becoming a much-loved fixture in the shop.

The site went up for auction a couple of months ago.

The council has set a deadline of January 16 for reaching a decision on the application.

Some key themes included within the Local Plan are:

The Climate Emergency and Cutting Carbon

The biggest challenge of all is Climate Change. This draft plan is setting the highest possible standards for environmental design for homes and commercial development – its policies are designed to cut carbon and ensure it is safe and easy to walk, cycle and use other low carbon methods of transport.

Affordable Homes

This draft plan takes a new approach to affordable housing targets – replacing an expectation for affordable housing with a requirement for truly affordable homes that developers must achieve.

The Natural Environment

This local plan takes the approach of 'brownfield first' – both in prioritising the use of previously developed land over green fields, but also in the phasing of development. The sites proposed are those which have the best sustainability, can deliver affordable homes, and have the least environmental impact on our district. Over 90% of the sites that developers put forward have not been included in this plan.

In total, the draft Plan includes over 80 policies covering other themes including the historic environment, creating a vibrant economy and biodiversity and open space amongst others.

Cllr Jackie Porter, Cabinet Member for Place and the Local Plan says:

"We are very grateful for the feedback we have received so far which has helped us to develop this plan, but we are determined to make it even better and stronger and to do that we need your input. The plan, 'Your Place, your Plan', depends on it. I cannot emphasise enough how important your feedback is, so please do take the time to take part in this consultation and attend our drop in events. - Albany Farm BW2 (completed or close to completion)
- Tollgate Sawmill BW3 (approved in last plan)

New proposed site:

- Land North of Rareridge Lane BW4

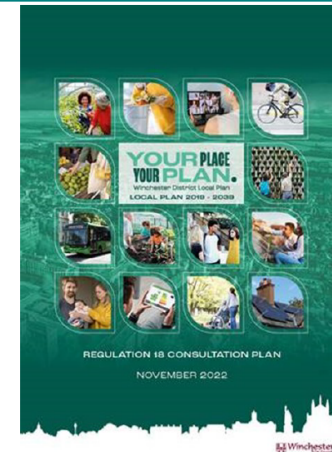

The proposed new site BW 4 Land North of Rareridge Lane is allocated 100 dwellings. If this site is approved, permission for any housing development would not be given before 2030.

The Council is aware of concerns raised by many residents over the impact of developments on the existing road network and the doctors' surgery.

Councillors are working with Hampshire County Council, Winchester City Council and the doctors to address these issues.

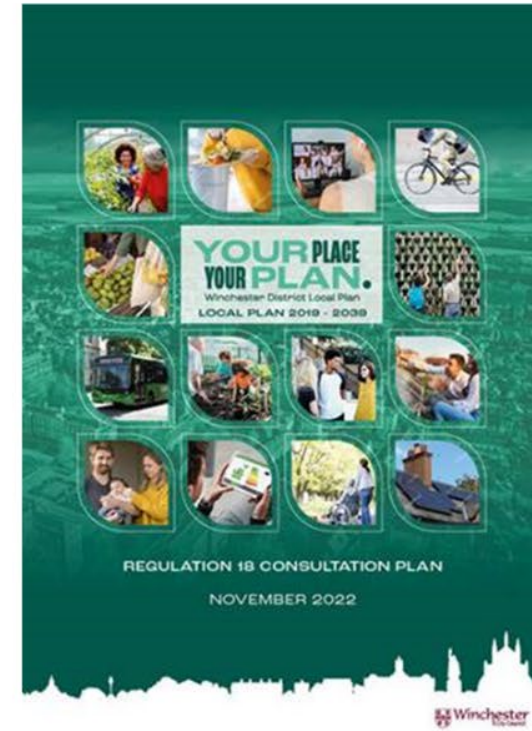

- Affordable housing – recognising it's more difficult for all ages (especially younger generations) to find homes they can afford, for the first time, the plan replaces an 'expectation' for affordable housing that was too often missed, with a minimum requirement that developers have to achieve
- A 'brownfield site first' approach across the district. All sites put forward in the plan have been assessed to have the best sustainability and have the least environmental impact on our district. 90% of sites submitted by developers have not been included.

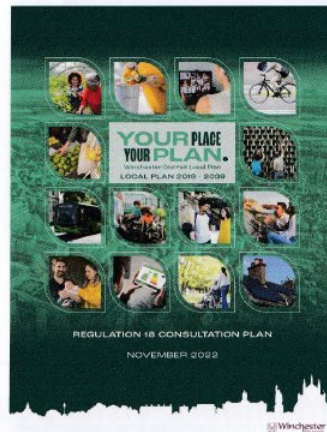
**Winchester District Regulation 18
Draft Local Plan 2019-2039**

This lengthy 560 page document has been published for public consultation by Winchester City Council. Comments have to be sent to the Council by Wednesday 14 December 2022.

The Plan sets out the vision and objectives of the Council for future development across the Winchester District, outside the South Downs National Park. The Plan covers a wide range of topics. Climate change (which influences all parts of the Plan), design, transport, biodiversity, historic environment, housing, employment and development allocations.

The Trust will be responding on the policies and proposals that are concerned with the future development of Winchester City. A key proposal for the City are the eleven site allocations for development shown in the plan. Four sites are existing allocations: Barton Farm, Station Approach, Central Winchester Area and Bushfield Camp. The capacity of these sites for housing development, plus windfall sites, has been calculated in the Plan. They could provide 5671 new houses in the plan period.

The 2021 census gave Winchester City a



population of 45,184. On the basis of 2.5 persons per household, 5671 new houses would increase the population by 14,177 to 59,361.

The population of Winchester in 1861 was 14,776. The Trust plans to challenge the 'capacity calculation'. The critical criterion for additional houses is 'need', and the capacity of infrastructure to serve them whilst conserving the character of the City and protecting its landscape setting.

The City of Winchester Movement ▶

Strategy Consultation started in Autumn 2017. Detailed proposals to implement this Strategy remain to be set out and adopted. The Trust had hoped that in 2022, policies and proposals for the City in this draft Plan would have been fully informed by the Strategy. Instead the Strategy remains in a state of aspiration.

The Trust would like to hear comments from members about the draft Plan (which can be viewed online at www.localplan.winchester.gov.uk).

The Trust will be submitting a comprehensive response to the consultation. This will be published on our website.

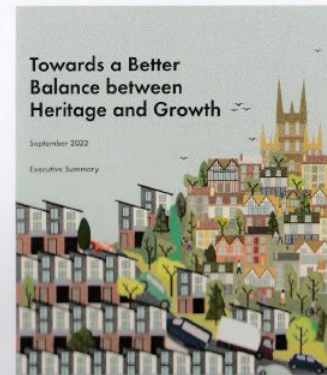
Heritage and Growth in Cathedral Cities: finding a better balance

The Trust is one of 13 civic societies located in historic cathedral cities which have contributed to a report analysing the impact of recent developments on their character, setting and heritage assets. The aim of the work is to show how their historic character can be maintained while also accommodating development. The work began in 2019 and the final report was published in 2022. The report is the result of a collaboration between the Alliance of Historic Cathedral Cities and Towns, the Historic Towns and Villages Forum and Allies and Morrison Urban Practitioners, with funding from Historic England.

The Trust has organised for the authors of the report to present their findings and recommendations to Trust members and other interested parties. We will be inviting representatives from Winchester City Council, in line with one of the recommendations that civic societies should work collaboratively with their local

authorities in protecting heritage and fostering good design.

- The plan takes a new approach to affordable housing targets - replacing an expectation for affordable housing with a requirement for truly affordable homes that developers must achieve.
- The plan takes the approach of 'brownfield first' - both in prioritising the use of previously developed land over green fields, but also in the phasing of development.

SPC challenges the figures given in the housing support sources, detailed in the draft plan.

The houses planned for WC1 should not be more than 60

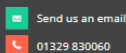
The development should be in keeping with the density, design and layout of other new sites within the settlement boundary

Proposals for changes to the Local Plan

- This is the first version of the new Local Plan (Regulation 18), that includes the proposed development policies and the proposed allocation of sites for new development. There are some significant changes in the policies that have come forward.
- Energy efficiency. New homes will need to be built with no fossil fuels used for heating or cooking and must operate at net zero carbon. Developers may find this target hard to deliver initially.
- Water efficiency. New and refurbished homes will have to manage the use of water very carefully. This will need external assessors that will add costs for smaller schemes.
- Sustainable Travel. New homes that generate extra demand for travel will need to contribute to public transport schemes. In rural areas, it is hard to see how this can be used to improve local travel arrangements.
- Affordable Housing. More flexibility in the amount of affordable housing is proposed, with a lower % required on brownfield land. Of the affordable homes built on a site, 65% must be for rent and 25% must be "First Homes" (always to be sold at 25% below the market price).

Proposals for new development site allocations were also published. These include 900 new homes at Sir John Moore Barracks, but without any of the safeguards to the rural character of Littleton that the Parish Council are demanding.

Despite rejection by South Wonston Parish Council, allocations for 63 new homes have been made in the village, including sites near Chaucer Close and West Hill Road North. We will continue to object to developments on green fields in the countryside like these when brownfield sites exist.

Soon after the death of Her Majesty, Queen Elizabeth II, we were all proud to come together as a Council to parade in front of Winchester Guildhall. There we heard the Mayor of Winchester give the local **Proclamation of Accession for King Charles III**. This ancient ceremony marked the beginning of a new reign, so our involvement in this important event was very moving.

We have recently joined the Adjutant General's Corps based at Worthy Down as they exercised their **Freedom of the City**. The right of Freedom of Entry is an ancient privilege and allows a

Regiment to parade through the City with 'bayonets fixed, drums beating and colours flying'. It comes from a period in our history when only trusted units would be allowed to carry arms within city boundaries.

We all need to keep a watchful eye on the proposal for the **Three Maids Hill anaerobic digestion plant**. A summary of the August public consultation is here https://www.sparsholtparish.org/Media/Documents/B/Planning/Three_Maids_Public_consultation_summary.pdf

It was announced that WCC will be launching a £200,000 **Cost of Living Support Package** for households in the district that may be struggling during the crisis. This is in addition to the support being provided by central Government and takes into account the council's local understanding of the impact of the crisis on the residents of Winchester.

Winchester City Council is working with Network Rail and London and Continental Railways (LCR) to explore potential opportunities for the regeneration in the area around **Winchester Railway Station**.

Winchester City Council has now published its draft Local Plan. This document sets out the amount of new houses to be built in the Winchester district over the next 20 years. The good news for Swanmore is that we have been allocated NO new housing over and above the 100 houses already allocated to be built at The Lakes.

This is a significant change from the figure of an additional 90 to 100 houses that was given to us by Winchester in March. As promised at the time, we continued to challenge that number and in particular our position within the Settlement Hierarchy document which allocated Swanmore similar housing numbers to larger villages such as Wickham and Denmead. The Parish Council's view is that Swanmore is not sustainable, is already overstretched and lacks the required facilities and infrastructure for more housing. The additional 90 to 100 houses would not have come with any "extras" so we are very pleased to note that, under the draft Plan, we have been reclassified as an "intermediate settlement" with a lower housing allocation that will be satisfied by the additional housing on The Lakes due to be built in the next year or so.

Please note that the draft Local Plan is still subject to change, both as a result of the consultation process and the Plan then has to be approved nationally by the Planning Inspector.

I wanted to take this opportunity to also update you on a few points.

Questions raised at Scrutiny Committee

Queries raised at the recent Scrutiny/LPAG meeting regarding the Local Plan were the subject of appendix 3 to the subsequent Local Plan report considered by Cabinet at their meeting of 18 October. The appendix included the following extract -

Further to these officer responses , we have heard back from the viability consultants Dixon Searle and would add the following comments, with reference to the numbering in the table above.

Point 4

It should be noted that the Government considers that the main benefits of Self and Custom Build housing is that it helps to diversify the housing market and increase consumer choice. They are not necessarily a substitute for affordable housing. The Council's *Strategic Housing Market Assessment* document prepared by Icenic consultants, recommended a range of options for the Council to consider when addressing the need for custom and self build housing, but did not suggest that such schemes needed land at below market value to come forward. Officers have since referred the issue to the Council's viability consultants Dixon Searle. They have advised that although the value of plots can vary significantly, in the case of schemes coming forward under draft Policy H5 they do not expect this to have a negative impact on viability. Therefore it is considered appropriate to provide some additional wording in the supporting text about how the marketing of sites for custom and self build housing will work, but not specify that they may be marketed for less than market value.

Therefore the following change was made to the draft plan prior to the publication of the consultation version, in accordance with the authority delegated to the Planning Policy Manger -

New paragraph to follow 9.31 in supporting text to policy H5 –

The criteria set out in Policy H5 requires details of marketing undertaken to demonstrate that purchasers of self or custom build housing have been sought. The exercise should be able to demonstrate that the price and terms on which the land or premises were marketed were reasonable by comparison with similar examples of serviced plots in the local area. Information should be provided detailing any interest received from potential buyers since the marketing commenced. Where interest has been received and that interest has not been pursued, this must be documented.

Point 5

It is noted that self build and custom build can serve different parts of the market. However, it is not clear that the policy should differentiate between them for the purposes of seeking a number of such units on larger housing schemes. Some sites may lend themselves more to one product than the other. The Council's *Strategic Housing Market Assessment* document prepared by Icenic consultants, did not recommend a different approach for self or custom build housing and so it is not considered justified at this time. Further consideration will be given to this in the light of responses received to the forthcoming consultation.

As with other part of the draft plan, any responses to the consultation regarding the approach to self and custom build housing will be considered and reported to Members in due course.

Settlement Hierarchy

Members will be aware that this background report has been the subject of correspondence with parish councils, concerning both the availability of services and the methodology used in the assessment. This resulted in a draft update being published in September 2022 in support of the emerging Plan. Following further consideration of comments received, a final November 2022 update has now been prepared and published as part of the evidence base for the current consultation. This further update revised the frequency of bus services (and resulting scoring in the assessment) which serve South Wonston. This has resulted in a revised score in the hierarchy, but this change is not significant enough to warrant a change in the categorisation of South Wonston as an “intermediate settlement” in the hierarchy or the resulting proposal for development in the draft Plan.

Given the comments received regarding how bus services are assessed in the paper, this iteration includes a brief section explaining how they have been assessed, so that all parties are clear on how the assessment has been undertaken. This will be part of the consultation so once this has closed we can consider the responses to this document made by all parties, and advise you regarding whether any issues raised warrant further amendments or revisions to this document. The revised document forms part of the evidence base for the emerging Local Plan and is available on the website [here](#).

Proposed allocation site BW4 – Land North of Rareridge Lane Bishops Waltham

This land has been identified in the Council’s SHELA A as site BW17 since 2018. The boundary of the site included a triangle of land (partially wooded) to the north of Rareridge Lane, and a property fronting Hoe Road. It has now come to our attention that the boundary of the site is incorrectly drawn, and the proposed access onto Hoe Road is actually intended to utilise the removal of two properties immediately to west of that identified.

We have contacted the site promoters who confirmed this is the case, and have provided a revised site plan identifying the land in question, and confirming that they act on behalf of all the landowners contained within that revised boundary. We have also advised Hampshire County Council Highways (who provided initial transport and access advice on proposed site allocations) and they have confirmed that this will not lead to an amendment of their advice on site access.

We have written to the occupier of the incorrectly identified property confirming our understanding of the position, to Ward Members and the Parish Council. We intend to carry out the consultation as envisaged, but will be mindful of the change and be able to confirm this at the public event in Bishop’s Waltham scheduled for 18 November.

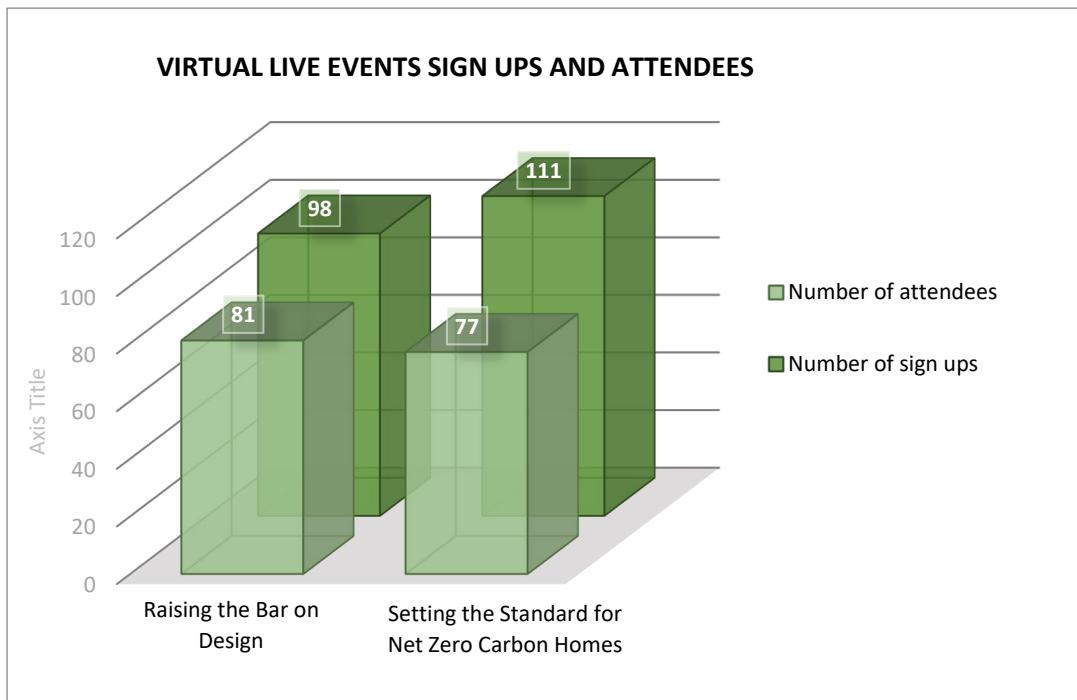

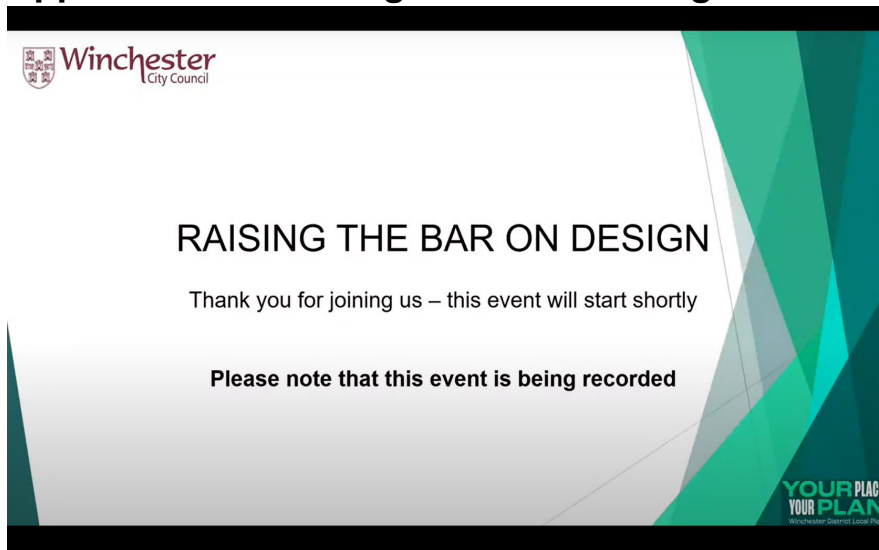

The Regulation 18 consultation for the draft Winchester District Local Plan 2039 was held for 6 weeks between 2 November and 14 December 2022. The council undertook several public consultation exercises. This note focusses on the public exhibitions and drop-in sessions held to accompany, promote, and explain the consultation.

The aim was to maximise peoples' opportunity to attend, by holding exhibitions in a range of locations across the district to minimise the distance people had to travel, and to hold these public sessions for extended periods of time from the early afternoon (2:30pm) into the evening (7pm). Additionally, locations were selected with an even distribution across the North and South of the District to allow people multiple opportunities to attend.

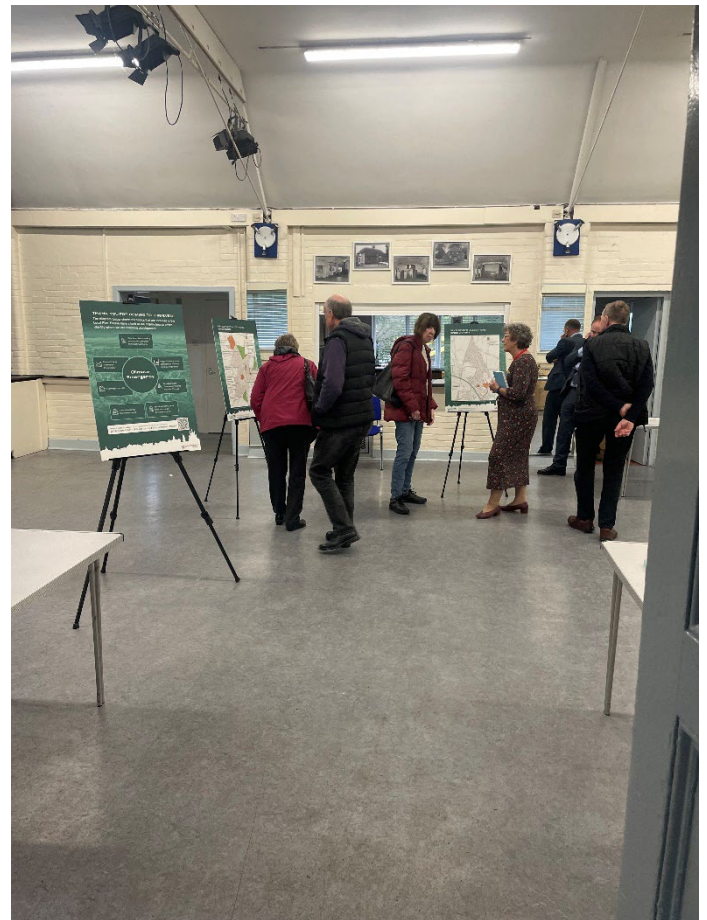
The numbers of those who attended these public consultation events varied widely, which is likely to have been influenced by the sites that induced specific local concerns in certain areas, and the amount of publicising of the event in the area. The Kings Worthy drop-in session had 10 attendees, and likely explanations are the lack of specific local concerns in this area, and its position as the first event which may have had less time to be publicised because it was only 5 days after the opening of the consultation. In contrast, the event in Bishop's Waltham was the most highly attended, reaching 73 attendees who highlighted specific local concerns. This was also well publicised in local newsletters and the parish council website.

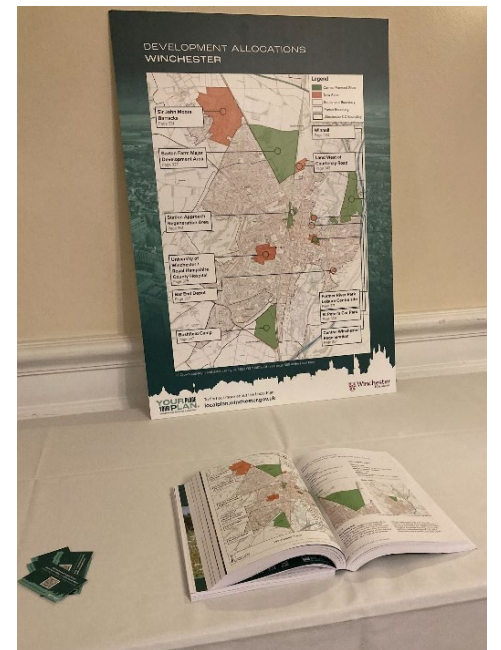

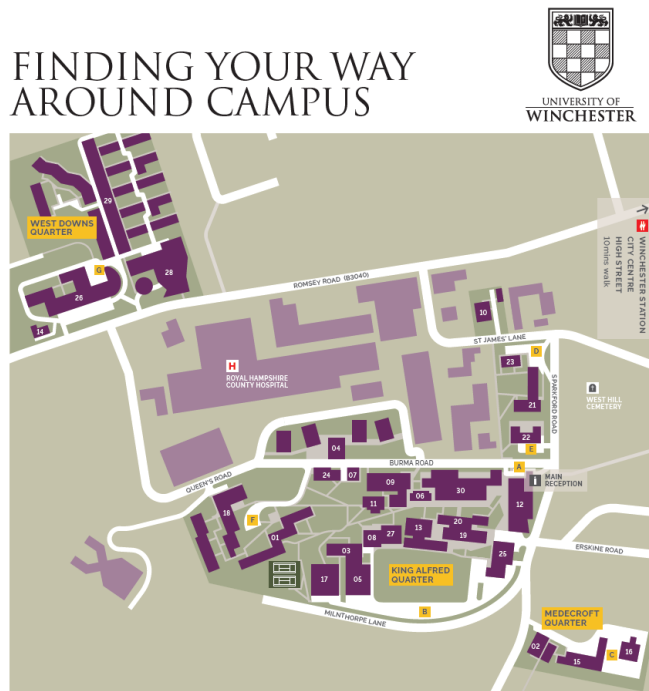

Overview

What is a Local Plan?

The Local Plan is the long-term plan for the Winchester District until 2039, outside the South Downs National Park. The Local Plan addresses a range of matters: the climate emergency, the highest standards possible for environmental design for homes and for commercial development, affordable housing, low carbon methods of transport and the natural and historic environment.

This local plan is a significant change to our previous plan and it has addressed some major challenges:

- The biggest challenge of all is climate change and this draft plan is setting the highest possible standards for environmental design for homes and commercial development and ensure that climate change and adaptation are a central issue for the local plan.
- The plan takes a new approach to affordable housing targets – replacing an expectation for affordable housing with a requirement for truly affordable homes that developers must achieve.
- The plan takes the approach of 'brownfield first' – both in prioritising the use of previously developed land over green fields, but also in the phasing of development.
